





Jay and Jim were at school on Friday. On Friday, they got to paint with Miss Brown.





"I will make a tractor from clay," said another kid. "Then I will paint it." The boy in the chair next to him said, "I will sketch something on this pad."




Jim was stuck! He could not think of what to make. He could see Jay at his desk and went to sit next to him. Jim was going to copy him.




